Article 1

CONSIDERING that Protocol A/P1/12/99 referred to above establishes a Mediation and Security Council whose function is to take emergency decisions on critical issues of peace and security on behalf of the Authority of Heads of State and Government;

AWARE that the two of the nine Member States comprising the Mediation and Security Council, namely the current Chairman and the Immediate past Chairman of the Authority, shall have an automatic right of membership to the mediation and Security Council;

MINDFUL of Decision A/Dec. 12/12/99 relating to the designation of Member States to the Mediation and Security Council;

CONSIDERING that the tenure of the Council designated above has expired;

AWARE ALSO that the other seven (7) members of the Mediation and Security Council shall be elected by the Authority and shall serve for a two-year renewable term;

DESIRING to sustain the authority of the Mediation and Security Council to take decisions on issues of peace and security on our behalf and to designate Member States that will constitute the Mediation and Security Council for the mandated period

ON THE RECOMMENDATION of the meeting of Mininsters of Foreign Affairs held in Dakar on 17 December, 2001;

DECIDES:

Article 1

The Mediation and Security Council shall be composed of nine (9) Member States which are the Member States of the current chairman of the

Authority and the immediate past chairman of the Authority, both of whom have an automatic right to membership, and seven (7) other elected Member States.

Article 2

Without prejudice to the provisions of Article 8 of the Protocol mentioned in the preamble, and Article 1 above, the composition of the Mediation and Security Council shall for 2002 and 2003, comprise the following ten (10) Member States:

MINDFUL of Decision A/DEC.12/12/00 of 16 December adopting a sub-regional plan of action for Integrated Water Resource Management (IWRM);

AWARE of the vulnerability and scarcity of fresh water resources and the importance of their social, economic and environmental role;

CONVINCED of the need to strengthen cooperation between Member States in order to ensure the sustainable development and management of shared water resources:

TAKING NOTE of the outcome of the Ministerial Monitoring Committee (MMC) meeting of 12 July 2001, relating to the institutional framework for integrated water resource management in the subregion;

ON THE RECOMMENDATION of the forty-eighth session of the Council of Ministers held in Dakar from 15 to 17 December 2001;

DECIDES

Article 1 ESTABLISHMENT

A Permanent Coordinating and Monitoring Framework for Integrated Water Resource Management (PCMF) is hereby established within the Executive Secretariat.

Article 2 OBJECTIVES

The Permanent Coordinating and Monitoring Framework shall:

- (a) Ensure a shift from sectoral and technocratic management of water resources to a holistic and participatory approach.
- (b) Promote and strengthen regional cooperation so as to foster and facilitate coordinated development and management of shared water resources.
- (c) Promote and facilitate the establishment of a consultative framework for riverine countries sharing common or cross border water resources.
- (d) Coordinate and ensure the implementation of the Integrated Water Resource Management project and the sub-regional plan of action.

Article 3 ORGANS

The organs of the Permanent Coordination and Monitoring Framework are as follows

- (a) Ministerial Monitoring Committee (MMC)
- (b) Technical Committee of Experts
- (c) Sub-regional Consultative Council and the IWRM
- (d) The IWRM coordinating unit.

Article 4 THE MINISTERIAL MONITORING COMMITTEE

The Ministerial Monitoring Committee shall comprise Ministers of Water Resources of Member States. It shall be the steering committee of the PCMF. It will be responsible for defining the Community's water policy and ensure the attainment of the IMWR and the sub-regional plan of action.

Article 5 THE TECHNICAL COMMITTEE OF EXPERTS

The Technical Committee of Experts shall comprise water resource experts of Member States and representatives of water resource organisations of the

region. The Experts shall also play the role of national focal points. The Technical Committee of Experts shall prepare meetings of Ministerial Monitoring Committee and ensure the implementation of its recommendations.

Article 6 SUB-REGIONAL CONSULTATIVE COUNCIL

The sub-regional Consultative Council on Integrated Water Resource Management (IWRM) shall be a consultative body composed of the members of the Technical Committee of Experts, representatives of government agencies, inter-government and non-governmental organisations, professional from the water sector, the private sector and development partners; It shall be consulted on water-related issues of interest to the region.

Article 7 COORDINATING UNIT

The coordinating unit shall be the executive organ of the permanent Coordination and monitoring framework (PCMF) the implementation of decisions taken by the Ministerial Monitoring Committee. Furthermore, it shall monitor and oversee ECOWAS water resource management activities. It shall be under the authority of the ECOWAS Deputy Executive Secretary in charge of Imtegration Programmes. It shall be a Department established in Burkina Faso.

Article 8 FINAL PROVISIONS

The texts governing the organisation and functioning of the PCMF organs shall be adopted by the ministerial monitoring committee.

Article 9 PUBLICATION

This Decision shall be published by the Executive Secretarial in the Official Journal of the Community within thirty (30) days of its signature by the Chairman of the Authority of Heads of State and Government. It shall also be published in the Official Gazette of each Member State within the same time frame.

The capital structure of ECOWAS Fund is hereby confirmed as follows

THE AUTHORITY OF HEADS OF STATE AND GOVERNMENT,

M NDFUL of Articles 7, 8 and 9 of the Treaty establishing the Authority of Heads of State and Government and defining its composition and functions:

MINDFUL of Articles 3, 4, 5, 51 and 55 of the Treaty relating to the realisation of the objective for the creation of an economic and monetary union;

MINDFUL of its Decision A/DEC.2/7/87 on the adoption of an ECOWAS monetary cooperation programme which envisages the creation of a single monetary zone within ECOWAS;

MINDFUL of its Decision A/DEC.7/12/99 relating to the adoption of macro-economic convergence criteria within the framework of the ECOWAS monetary cooperation programme;

RECALLING the importance that the Member States of the Community attach to the realisation and enhancement of the economic integration process in general and monetary integration in particular;

CONVINCED that the creation of a viable economic and monetary union in West Africa requires, through the institution of a multilateral surveillance mechanism, the harmonisation of the economic and financial policies as well as the macro-economic convergence of the Member States;

CONVINCED that a strict coordination of economic policies of Member States and their convergence are prerogatives for the creation of an economic and monetary union;

DESIRING to fully implement the convergence measures adopted and to specify the practical modalities for the organisation and implementation of the multilateral surveillance.

UPON THE RECOMMENDATION of the Convergence Council which met in Dakar on 18 December 2001.

DECIDES

I) OBJECTIVE OF THE MULTILATERAL SURVEILLANCE

Article 1

- i) It is hereby established a mechanism for the multilateral surveillance of their economic and financial policies of Member States.
- ii) The multilateral surveillance shall ensure the achievement of the closest coordination of the economic policies of Member States and the convergence of the national economies.

II) INSTITUTIONAL PROVISIONS OF THE MULTILATERAL SURVEILLANCE

Article 2: ORGANS OF THE MECHANISM

The regional surveillance mechanism shall be based on the following organs.

- * The Convergence Council
- * The Technical Monitoring Committee
- * The West African Monetary Agency (WAMA) and the ECOWAS Executive Secretariat
- * The National Coordinating Committees (NCC)

Article 3: THE CONVERGENCE COUNCIL

- i) The Convergence Council shall be composed of Ministers of Finance and Governors of Central Banks of Member States. It shall be the ECOWAS organ empowered to conduct the multilateral surveillance of the convergence of the macro-economic policies and performance of Member State. This shall be done in particular on the basis of half-yearly reports on the convergence process as submitted to it by the Technical Monitoring Committee referred to in Article 2 of this decision as defined in Article 4 below.
- ii) Within the framework of the multilateral surveillace, the Convergence Council shall review and approve the half-yearly reports on the operation of the multilateral surveillance mechanism mentioned in Article 4 below. The Convergence Council shall submit to the Authority progress reports on the harmonisation and convergence of policies and performance of the economies in the Community.

Article 4: THE TECHNICAL MONITORING COMMITTEE

i) The Technical Monitoring Committee shall be composed of representative of the Ministries of Finance of Member States and Directors of Research of Central Banks. It shall be responsible for the secretariat of the Convergence Council

- ii) The Technical Monitoring Committee shall be responsible for the monitoring of the convergence process. It shall ensure the compatibility of the draft pluri-annual convergence programmes envisaged in Article 7 of this decision with the convergence objectives of the Community before submitting these draft programmes to the Convergence Council for adoption.
- iii) The Technical Monitoring Committee Shall prepare and submit a half-yearly report on the implementation of the convergence programmes stipulated in Artcle 7 of this decision. It shall supervise the work carried out by WAMA, ECOWAS Executive Secretariat and the national coordination committees.

Article 5: THE WEST AFRICAN MONETARY AGENCY (WAMA) AND THE ECOWAS EXECUTIVE SECRETARIAT.

- i) A joint secretariat composed of WAMA and the ECOWAS Executive Secretariat is hereby set up to prepare meetings of the Technical Monitoring Committee and the Convergence Council on the multilateral surveillance mechanism. The composition and functioning of this joint secretariat shall be defined by the Conver gence Council.
- ii) WAMA and the Executive Secretariat, in collaboration with the national coodination committees shall be responsible for monitoring the preparation of the half-yearly reports provided for in Article 4 of this decision.
- iii) The joint secretariat shall be the operational centre of the surveillance mechanism. To this end, it shall:
 - * Manage the surveillance mechanism database by ensuring the accuracy, comparability and availability of the relevant data;
 - Prepare and submit half-yearly progress reports to the Technical Monitoring Committee and the Convergence Council, the verification shall enable the set objectives of the multilateral surveillance.

Article 6: NATIONAL COORDINATING COMMITTEES (NCC)

i) For the purpose of the multilateral surveillance hereby, each member State undertakes to set up the national coodination committee mentioned in Article 2 within a

- maximum period of 2 months from the date of adoption of this decision. In this regard, each Member State shall enact a law creating its national coordination committee.
- ii) The national committee on economic policy (CNPE) of UEMCA countries shall play the role and carry out the functions of the ECOWAS national coordination committee.
- iii) The National Co-ordinating Committees shall assist WAMA and the ECOWAS Executive Secretariat in the collection, processing analysis of data on each Member State. To this end, each National Committee shall:
 - Manage a statistical data base:
 - Prepare a report on the current economic performance of its country, highlighting the evolution of the convergence critera.
 - Monitor economic policies by compiling and analysing relevant recent decisions and assessing their impact on the economic and financial sector.
- iv) The national coordination committees shall forward every three months to the Executive Secretariat a background report on the evolution of the convergence criteria.
- v) The National Coodinating Committees shall be composed of heads of the relevant national services. They shall be ex-officio members appointed on the basis of their in volvement in the formulation and implementation of national economic and financial policies. They shall be drawn, essentially from the following services:
 - Treasury Department
 - Internal Revenue Department
 - Customs Department
 - Budget Department
 - Debt Office
 - Economic Forecasting Department
 - Planning Department
 - National Statistical Service
 - Central Bank
 - external Trade Department
 - Economic Affairs Department
 - Regional Integration Department.
- vi) Each Member State may constitute the National Coordination Committee (NCC) in accordance with the national administrative structure and its particular needs, but on the basis of the list of department set out above.

- vii) The chairman of each committee shall be a high-ranking official appointed by the State. The Central Bank shall provide the technical secretariat of the committee. Member States undertake to take all necessary measures toguarantee the committees access to the statistics of their respective countries, and to ensure efficient execution of their assignment by placing them under the supervision of an appropriate authority.
- viii) Within the exclusive context of their mandate, members of the national committees are empowered to hold consultations among themselves and communicate with members of other national committees, they undertake to observe the confidentiality of their assignment.
- ix) Each national committee shall meet upon convocation by its chairman, it shall adopt its rules of procedure which will be forwarded to the Technical monitoring Committee.

Article 7: CONVERGENCE PROGRAMME

Each Member State submit to WAMA and the ECOWAS Executive Secretariat, within a period of three (3) months from the entry into force of this decision, a pluri-annual programme which conforms with the economic convergence objectives of the Community and is designed to ensure the achievement within the prescribed time limit (2004) of the convergence

Article 8: FREQUENCY OF CONSIDERATION OF COUNTRY REPORTS

- The multilateral surveillance is based on the evaluation of half-yearly progress reports on the economic situation of ECOWAS Member States. The reviews shall be conducted in April and September of each year by the Convergence Council, except other wise modified by its chairman.
- ii) The April Report shall evaluate the economic and compliance with the objectives set for the previous year. On the basis of the performance recorded, the report shall propose a revision of the objectives fixed for the current year.
- iii) The September Report shall have the Principal objective of providing guidelines to be taken into account by each Member State for the formulation of its macro-economic policies for the following year particularly with regard to the coherence of the budgetary policies with the convergence objectives.

Article 9: SUPPORT TO MEMBER STATES

The ECOWAS Secretariat and WAMA shall take all necessary measures in support of the functioning of the national coordination committees.

Article 10: EXCEPTIONAL CIRCUMSTANCES

- i) Exceptional circumstances as referred to in Article 8(ii) are governed by the following considerations:
- ii) The situation is said to be exceptional where non-compliance with a primary criterion has been due to force majeure entailing:
- * Negative economic developments, reflected in a decline in real GDP of at least three percentage points below the average for the previous three (3) years, which the Convergence Council Considers as temporary;

PROGRAMME: INSTITUTIONALIZATION OF A CONFERENCE OF ECOWAS MINISTERS OF PUBLIC SERVICE

1.0 INTRODUCTION:

- The Third Biennial Pan-African Conference of 1.1 the Ministers of the Civil Service held in Windhoek, Namibia, from 5th - 8th February, 2001, had adopted a Charter for the Public Service of Africa. The Charter is aimed not only at reorientating the public service to its primary mission of serving the people and the government of the nation - states, but also at attuning the Public Service to the challennges of globalization. The Charter states the principles and rules of conduct (Notes) for public and state employees and also underscores the political will and moral commitment of African States to improve the services provided tocitizens
- 1.2 In the Windhoek Declaration issued at the end of the conference, African sub-regional organisations were tasked to ensure the application as well as the monitoring of the application of the charter by the governments of their respective sub-regions. This task is to be undertaken in collaboration with the African Centre for Training in Administration for Development (CAFRAD).
- 1.3 The Executive Secretariat therefore considered it expedient to create a common sub-regional public service forum for the implementation of the Charter.
- 1.4 To this end, the Executive Secretariat intends to hold a preliminary three dray sensitization workshop or seminar to popularize the Charter and also to fashion out strategies for its continuous implementation.

2.0 OBJECTIVES OF THE PROGRAMME:

2.1 Overall Objectives:

The Creation of a sub-regional plaform to promote the application in West Africa of the African Public Service Charter. This is aimed at bringing about a positive attitudinal change in public servants in the ECOWAS sub-region in relation to the Integration policies and programmes of ECOWAS

2.2 Specific Objectives

2.2.1 The spcific objectives will be to take first steps and work out the modalities for the smooth implementation of the provisions of the Charter through the experts and Ministers of Public Service Administration of the ECOWAS sub-region.

3.0 JUSTIFICATION

Windhoek Declaration and the New Partnership for Africa's Development (NEPAD)

3.1 As the agencies charged with the responsibility for the implementation of government policies, the need to structurally involve experts and Ministers of public service in the implementation of the charter cannot be over-emphasised Effective application of the provisions of the charter must of course flow from the national level and interface with objectives adopted at the sub-regional level and thereafter with Regional objectives. Parmanent framework for coordination required within the Regional Public Service and under the umbrella of ECOWAS is being envisaged.

4.0 REQUIREMENTS

4.1 The Executive Secretariat envisages the funding of the participation of the experts from outside Nigeria as a way of ensuring an impressive turn out at the workshop. In addition three Resources Persons will be required to deliver papers and also participate in the programme.

Article 1

The budget of the Executive Secretariat for the 2002 Financial Year, balanced in income and expenditure at the sum of twelve million, seven hundred and thirty one thousand, five hundred Units of Accounts (12,731,500 UA) is hereby approved.

Article 2

An amount of nine million, five hundred and sixtyone thousand Units of Accounts (9,561,000 UA) shall be derived from the annual contributions of Member States. A sum of three million Units Accounts (3,000,000 UA) shall be obtained from arrears paid in respect of past budgets, and another sum of one hundred and seventy thousand, five hundred Unit of Accounts (170,500 UA) shall be derived from other sources.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER,1999

NOTE 1: PRESENTATION OF ECOWAS, ACCOUNTING AND POLICIES

1) PRESENTATION OF ECOWAS

The Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS) was created by the Treaty of 25 May 1975.

The aim of the founding fathers at the times of its creation was to attain a collective self-sufficiency through the integration of 16 West African countris' int an Economic Community having a unique common market.

1. OBJECTIVE

The general objective of ECOWAS is to promote coperation and integration with the view of creating an Economic and Monetary Union aimed at fostering the economic expansion and the development of Western Africa.

For that purpose, the following aims are targeted:

- The suppression of the customs duties and taxes;
- ii) The establishment of a Common External Tariff:
- iii) The harmonization of the economic and financial policies;
- iv) The creation of a monetary zone.

Benin, Burkina Faso, Cape Verde, Cote d'Ivoire, The Gambia, Ghana, Guinea, Guinea Bissau, Liberia, Mali, Mauritania, Niger, Nigeria, Sierra Leone, Senegal, Togo.

In face of the slow progress realized by ECOWAS, the 1975 Treaty has been revised. The supranationality principles are introduced in the implementation of the decisions and the autonomous financing of the budgets of the institutions. In addition, the creation ogf supranational institutions of control and arbitrage over the application of the decisions: the Court of Justice, the Parliament, the Economic and Social Council.

2. ECOWAS INSTITUTIONS

The surpreme executive decision-making body, named the Authority, i.e the Heads of State and Government Conference, is above the Council of Ministers composed of two (2) representing Ministers per Member State. The council of Ministers sees to the proper functioning and development of the Community and gives directions to the diverse executing institutions of the Community, including the ECOWAS FUND headquartered in LOME (Togo).

All the council decisions and directions commit the said institutions.

The administration and Finance Commission, created in pursuance of article 22 of the revised Treaty:

- Examines the activities reports from the Executive Secretary an the Financial Controller as well as the auditor's reports;
- Proffers recommendations to the council of Ministers with respect to the different budget categories together with the definitive total budget amount.

The Executive Secretariat whose the headquarters are located at Abuja (Nigeria) is charged with the coordination and inplementation of the Council decisions

3. IMMUNITIES AND PRIVILEGES

ECOWAS is accorded, in the territiry of each Member State, a legal status and enjoys similarly to the Diplomatic corps, the immunities and privileges indispensable for the furtherance of its functions and aims Accordingly, the Community, its revenues, properties and other goods are exonerated of:

- All direct and indirect taxes (except the taxes representing mere remuneration of services of public utility);
- b) All customs duties, prohibition and restriction of imports as regards commodities imported or exported by the Community and destined for its official use. Similarly, the ECOWAS international staff-members are taxexonerated on their salaries and remunerations derives practically 95% of its revenues from the Member States contributions.

11) ACCOUNTING REGULATIONS AND METHODS

1. MONETARY BASIS OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements are expressed in Units of Accounts (UA). The value of (1) Unit of Account is equivalent to (1) SDR as determined by the International Monetary Fund (IMF).

2. TRANSLATION OF CURRENCIES

2.1 In compliance with IAS 21, translation differences, like the gains or losses on exchanges resulting from conversion of currencies into any other currencies are included in the determination of net income.

The Executive Secretariat conducts operations in various currencies Pursuant to the provision of article 012 of the Financial Regulations and Manual of Accounting Procedures, the following conversion rates were utilized for the translation of currencies in Units of Accounts as at 31st December 1999.

- 2.2 Receipts, other than the contributions and operational expenses are converted by using the average of all rates of the preceding quarter.
- 2.3 Investment expenditure are converted at the SDR rate ruling on the date of the investment.
- 2.4 Equipment expenditure are converted at the SDR rate ruling on the billing date.

3. FIXED ASSETS

Fixed assets are stated on the following basis

3.1 Land and Building are shown at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is calculated at a rate which is expected to amortize the cost in equal annual instalments over the useful life which is estimated at 20 years.

3.2 Motor vehicles, furnitures, equipments are stated at cost less accmulated depreciation. Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line basis so as to write off the cost of the assets over their estimated useful lives which are as follows:

Motor vehicles : 4 Years

Furniture and equipment : 5 Years

4. INVESTMENT

Investments consist of time deposits and call deposits in banks within Member States or in Europe. Bank balances are converted into U.A. at the rates ruling on the balance sheet date.

5. MEMBER-STATE CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY BUDGET

5.1 Annual Contributions

The Contribution due by Member-States, designed for financing the Executive Secretariat budget for a given financial year are recorded, in their whole amount, in "Calls due" (debit) and in the receipts accounts (credit).

At the time of receiving the payments made by the states, the bank accounts are debited while are credited the "Calls due accounts"

5.2 Calls in-Arrears

The calls in - arrears consist of the outstanding payments due by Member-Statres on their annual contributions

They are recorded in the balance sheet assets in the "Accunts Receivable-Members States" (debit) aand in the balance sheet liabilities in "Calls in arrears accounts (credit).

Each year, the payments made against the "Calls in -arrears" are recorded in the receipt of the profit and loss account while debting the calls in -arrears accounts"

We conducted our audit in accordance with the International Standards on Auditing. Our audit work included the conduct of all steps and tests deemed necessary in such circumstances, as regards:

- The observance of the utilization conditions of the grants;
- The assurance that the expenditures are made in conformity with the provision of the grants agreements signed between the Executive Secretariat of ECOWAS and the financing institutions.

The review of the accounts was essentially to determine wether the costs incurred are eligible, allowable and allocable under the agreements terms signed with the financing institutions.

According to the results of our audit, it is our opinion that the financial resources received from the donor agencies have been managed in accordance with the clauses of the agreements signed between these agencies and the ECOWAS EXECUTIVE SECRETARIAT.

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER, 2000

NOTE 1: PRESENTATION OF ECOWAS, ACCOUNTING AND POLICIES

i) PRESENTATION OF ECOWAS

The Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS) was created by the Treaty of 25 May 1975.

The aim of the founding fathers at the times of its creation was to attain a collective self-sufficiency through the integration of 16 West African countris' int an Economic Community having a unique common market.

1. OBJECTIVE

The general objective of ECOWAS is to promote coperation and integration with the view of creating an Economic and Monetary Union aimed at fostering the economic expansion and the development of Western Africa.

For that purpose, the following aims are targeted:

- The suppression of the customs duties and taxes:
- ii) The establishment of a Common External Tariff:
- iii) The harmonization of the economic and financial policies;
- iv) The creation of a monetary zone.

Benin, Burkina Faso, Cape Verde, Cote d'Ivoire, The Gambia, Ghana Guinea, Guinea Bissau, Liberia, Mali, Mauritania, Niger, Nigeria, Sierra Leone, Senegal, Togo.

In face of the slow progress realized by ECOWAS, the 1975 Treaty has been revised. The supranationality principles are introduced in the implementation of the decisions and the autonomous financing of the budgets of the institutions. In addition, the creation ogf supranational institutions of control and arbitrage over the application of the decisions: the Court of Justice, the Parliament, the Economic and Social Council.

2. ECOWAS INSTITUTIONS

The surpreme executive decision-making body, named the Authority, i.e the Heads of State and Government Conference, is above the Council of Ministers composed of two (2) representing Ministers per Member State. The council of Ministers sees to the proper functioning and development of the Community and gives directions to the diverse executing institutions of the Community, including

the ECOWAS FUND headquartered in LOME (Togo). All the council decisions and directions commit the said institutions.

The administration and Finance Commission, created in pursuance of article 22 of the revised Treaty:

- Examines the activities reports from the Executive Secretary an the Financial Controller as well as the auditor's reports;
- Proffers recommendations to the council of Ministers with respect to the different budget categories together with the definitive total budget amount.

The Executive Secretariat whose the headquarters are located at Abuja (Nigeria) is charged with the coordination and inplementation of the Council decisions

3. IMMUNITIES AND PRIVILEGES

ECOWAS is accorded, in the territiry of each Member State, a legal status and enjoys similarly to the Diplomatic corps, the immunities and privileges indispensable for the furtherance of its functions and aims. Accordingly, the Community, its revenues, properties and other goods are exonerated of:

- All direct and indirect taxes (except the taxes representing mere remuneration of services of public utility);
- b) All customs duties, prohibition and restriction of imports as regards commodities imported or exported by the Community and destined for its official use.

Similarly, the ECOWAS international staff-members are tax-exonerated on their salaries and remunerations derives practically 95% of its revenues from the Member States contributions.

II) ACCOUNTING REGULATIONS AND METHODS

1. MONETARY BASIS OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements are expressed in Units of Accounts (UA). The value of (1) Unit of Account is equivalent to (1) SDR as determined by the International Monetary Fund (IMF).

2. TRANSLATION OF CURRENCIES

2.1 In compliance with IAS 21, translation differences, like the gains or losses on exchanges resulting from conversion of currencies into any other currencies are included in the determination of net income.

The Executive Secretariat conducts operations in various currencies Pursuant to the provision of article 012 of the Financial Regulations and Manual of Accounting Procedures, the following conversion rates were utilized for the translation of currencies in Units of Accounts as at 31st December 2000.

- 2.2 Receipts, other than the contributions and operational expenses are converted by using the average of all rates of the preceding quarter.
- 2.3 Investment expenditure are converted at the SDR rate ruling on the date of the investment.
- 2.4 Equipment expenditure are converted at the SDR rate ruling on the billing date.

3. FIXED ASSETS

Fixed assets are stated on the following basis

- 3.1 Land and Building are shown at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is calculated at a rate which is expected to amortize the cost in equal annual instalments over the useful life which is estimated at 20 years.
- 3.2 Motor vehicles, furnitures, equipments are stated at cost less accmulated depreciation. Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line basis so as to write off the cost of the assets over their estimated useful lives which are as follows:

- Motor vehicles : 4 Years

- Furniture and equipment : 5 Years

5. MEMBER-STATE CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY BUDGET

5.1 Annual Contributions

The Contribution due by Member-States, designed for financing the Executive Secretariat budget for a given financial year are recorded, in their whole amount, in "Calls due" (debit) and in the receipts accounts (credit). At the time of receiving the payments made by the states, the bank accounts are debited while are credited the "Calls due accounts"

5.2 Calls in-Arrears

The calls in - arrears consist of the outstanding payments due by Member-Statres on their annual contributions They are recorded in the balance sheet assets in the "Accunts Receivable-Members States" (debit) aand in the balance sheet liabilities in "Calls in arrears accounts (credit). Each year, the payments made against the "Calls in -arrears" are recorded in the receipt of the profit and loss account while debting the calls in -arrears accounts"

AUDITOR'S SUPPLEMENTARY NOTES

NOTE 1: COMMUNITY LEVY

The Protocol A/P1/7/96 on the application modalities of the Community Levy is, pursuant to Article 89 of the Revised Treaty, effctive since December 1999. The entry into force of the Protocol has been notified to all Member States immediately in January 2000.

From that date on , all Member States must apply the 0,5 % Levy from the CIF valve of goods originating from third-countries and deposit the levy into the bank account opened by the Executive Secretariat in each member-country Cenral Bank.

Despite the entry into effect of the Protocol since December 2000, only the bank statementss for seven (7) Member States out of fifteen (15) were available at the Secretariat.

Besides, the protocol provides in article 19.2 and 20 the limitation of the accumulated withdrawals that can be done annually by the Executive Secretariat from the proceeds of the levies deposited into the Central Bank account. The Minister charged with ECOWAS matters in each member-country communicates on the 1st January of each year limited withdrawals made from the Central Bank account.

Given the fact that certain Member-States, though significantly in-arrears in respect of their contributions, possess important amounts of money in their Central Bank account, we have recommended to the Executive Secretariat to carry out negotiations, at the begining of each year, with the Ministers of concerned Member-States, in order to fix a limited maximum amount permitting the payment of current as well as outstanding contributions.

NOTE 2: BORROWING FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF STAFF RESIDENCES

The Government of the Federal Republic of Nigeria has granted an interest-free loan to the ECOWAS EXECUTIVE SECRETARIAT in an amount of \$ EU 6 650 000 for the construction of staff residences. AS at 31 Decmber 2000, an amount of \$ EU 6 585 560 has been committed out of the construction cost.

We have recommended to the Secretariat to indicate on its financial statement as at 31 December 2000 the construction cost already committed as well as the borrowing amount.

The loan agreement signed on September 1st, 1997 with the Government of Nigeria stipulated that the loan is reimbursable in instalment of 20% deductible from annual contribution of Nigeria.

We have noted that any repayment has not been made in respect of that loan as of 31 December 2000.

We conducted our audit in accordance with the International Standards on Auditing. Our audit work included the conduct of all steps and tests deemed necessary in such circumstances, as regards:

- The observance of the utilization conditions of the grants;
- The assurance that the expenditures are made in conformity with the provision of the grants agreements signed between the Executive Secretariat of ECOWAS and the Financing Institutions.

The review of the accounts was essentially to determine wether the costs incurred are eligible, allowable and allocable under the agreements terms signed with the Financing Institutions.

According to the results of our audit, it is our opinion that the financial resources received from the donor agencies have been managed in accordance with the clauses of the agreements signed between these agencies and the ECOWAS EXECUTIVE SECRETARIAT.

This Regulation shall be published by the Executive Secretariat in the Official Journal of the Community within (30) days after its signature by the Chairman of the Council of Ministers. It shall also be published by each Member State within the same time frame in its National Gazette.

REGULATION C/REG.12/12/01 ON THE WORLD BANK REGIONAL INTEGRATION ASSISTANCE STRATEGY (RIAS) FOR THE WEST AFRICAN REGION

THE COUNCIL OF MINISTERS,

MINDFUL of Articles 10, 11 and 12 of the Treaty relating to the creation of the Council of Ministers and defining its composition and functions;

MINDFUL of the need to take the regional dimension of development into account in order to accelerate the growth and intergration of the West African Economic Community;

DESIROUS of establishing West Africa as a unified and open regional economy infrastructural services and financial services, in line with the declared vision of the West Africa region;

AFTER TAKING note of the outcome of the workshop organised in Bamako on 15 and 16 March 2001 on the World Bank regional assistance strategy as well as the outcome of the ECOWAS-UEMOA-World Bank meeting in Abuja from 8 to 10 October 2001 on the implementation modalities of the said strategy;

ENACTS

Article 1:

The elements of the World Bank regional integration assistance strategy for West Africa and matrix of activities identified at the meeting in Abuja from 8 to 10 October 2001 and annexed to this Regulation are hereby adopted.

Article 2:

The ECOWAS Executive Secretariat is requested to take the necessary measures for the diligent implementation of the matrix of activities referred to in Article 1 above.

Article 3:

The ECOWAS Executive Secretariat shall continue the joint reflection with the UEMOA Commission and other partners on the formulation of a regional poverty reduction strategy paper (RPRSP)

Article 4:

This regulation shall be published by the Executive Secretariat in the Official Journal of the Community

within thirty (30) of its signature by the Chairman of Council of Ministers. It shall also be published in the National Gazette by each Member State within the same time-frame.

FINAL COMMUNIQUE

TWENTY - FIFTH ORDINARY SESSION OF THE AUTHORITY OF HEADS OF STATE AND GOVERNMENT DAKAR, 20 - 21 DECEMBER, 2001

- The Authority of Heads of State and Government of the Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS) held its twenty-fifth ordinary session in Dakar, Republic of Senegal, on 20 and 21 December 2001. The meeting was chaired by His Excellency Alpha Oumar KONARE, President of the Republic of Mali, current Chairman of the ECOWAS Authority of Heads of State and Government.

TRIBUTE TO THE LATE PRESIDENT LEOPOLD SEDAR SENGHOR

5. The Authority was deeply grived by the news of the death of President Leopold Sedar Senghor, one of the founding fathers of ECOWAS, and paid a glowing tribute to the memory of this illustrious son African for his exceptional contributions to the emancipation of the African continents in general and the construction of ECOWAS in particular. A minute of silence was observed in honour of the late President, and the Authority extended its deepest condolences to the peoples of Senegal and of African on his passing.

OPENING CEREMONY

- 6 The addresses delivered at the opening ceremony were the welcome address by His Excellency, Maitre Abdoulaye Wade, President of the Republic of Senegal, the vote of thanks from the Heads of State and Government by His Excellency, John Kufuor, President of the Republic of Ghana, and the opening address by His Excellency, Alpha Oumar Konare, President of the Republic of Mali and current Chairman of ECOWAS. The Authority decided that these addresses should be retained as working documents for the summit. The Heads of State and Government reaffirmed their determination to build a strong, cohesive ECOWAS capable of contributing to the realisation of an African Union.
- Messages of support and encouragement were delivered to the 25th summit of the Authority from the United Nations Secretary General, the OAU Secretary General, the FAO Director General, and the President of the African Businessmen's Round Table.

THE AFRICAN UNION

8. The Authority welcomed the entry into force of the Constitutive Act of the African Union which marks a significant step towards the effctive integration of the African continent. The Authority appealed to Member States to take every necessary measure to ensure the implementation of this historic programme.

NEW PARTNERSHIP FOR AFRICAN'S DEVELOP-MENT (NEPAD)

9. The Auuthority noted with satisfaction the adottion of the New partnership for Africa's Development which constitutes an appropriate instrument for the development and integration of the African economics, and the

- alleviation of poverty in Africa. The Heads of State expressed their gratitude to Presidents Abdoulaye Wade of the Republic of SENEGAL and Olusegun Obasanjo of the Federal Republic of NIGERIA for their invaluable contribution to the formulation of the programme.
- 10. The Authority directed the ECOWAS Executive Secretariat to bring its policies and programmes into line with those of NEPAD, with a view to creating the synergy that would strengthen ECOWAS and enable it to contribute to the establiment of a strong African Union.

ECOWAS PROGRAMMES

- 11. The Authority adopted the reports of the Executive Secretary, the fourth extraordinary session of the Council of Ministers, the 48th session of the Council of Ministers, and the meeting of Ministers of Foreign Affairs These reports focused primarily on the following:
 - Harmonisation of ECOWAS and UEMOA integration programmes;
 - Frere Movement of persons;
 - Implementation of the common market;
 - Multilateral surveillance of economic policies;
 - Sectoral programmes for production and infrastructural development;
 - Human development programmes;
 - Administrative and financial matters;
 - Institutional matters;
 - Regional peace and security.
- 12. The Authority laid special emphasis on the following economic, institutional, peace and security issues:

ECONOMIC ISSUES

13. The Authority reviewed the modalities for the implementation of the strategy for accelerating the regional integration process, whose objective is to establishe West Africa as a unified economic zone. The Authority urged all Member States to implement the provisions of the ECOWAS trade liberalisation scheme within the shortest possible time.

and take all necessary measures to prepare their economics for the introduction of the ECOWAS common external tariff, based on the lowest existing customs duties which range from 0% to 20%. In this regard, the Authority noted with satisfaction that the ECOWAS Executive Secretariat and the **UEMOA** Commission have been organising meetings for the harmonisation of their programmes. The Authority appealed to the Chief executives of the two institutions to continue their coordination efforts. The Authority also urged all Member States to provide strong support for the actions undertaken within the framework of the ongoing harmonisation process.

14. The Authority stressed that the strengthening of the political and economic dimensions of regional integration must be accompanied by appropriate measures for the development of the national economics. In this regard, the Authority welcomed the information that the Republic of Cape Verde expressed its commitment to the effective implementation of ECOWAS programmes. The Authority repeated its directive to the Executive Secre tary to submit specific proposals in support of the socio-economic development of island and land-locked countries of the Community (Cape Verde, Burkina Faso, Mali and Niger). The Authority also requested the Executive Secretary to give priority to the promotion of integration programmes with a real poverty alleviation content

MONETARY COOPERATION PROGRAMME

- The Authority expressed appreciation of the unrelenting efforts of the countries in the second monetary zone to adopt a common currency
- 16. The Authority called on the ECOWAS Convergence Council. Composed of Ministers of Finance and Governors of ECOWAS Central Banks. to ensure the harmonisation of the programmes of the second monetary zone and those of the ECOWAS single monetary zone.
- 17. Consequently, the Authority urged all member States to ensure strict compliance with the ECOWAS macro-economic convergence criteria, a nessary condition for the estblishement of a single and viable monetary zone in West Africa.
- 18. The Authority adopted the decision relating to the organisation of the ECOWAS multilateral surveillance mechanism. To this end, it urged all Member States to set up

- their national coordination committees (NCC) designed to assist the ECOWAS Secretariat and the West African Monetary Agency (WAMA) in the compilation and analysis of statistical data necessary for performance evaluation under the convergence criteria.
- 19. In order to create the appropriate synergy between the CFA zone and the second West African Monetary Zone (WAMZ), the Authority decided that the name of the future ECOWAS common currency should be jointly determined by the relevant authorities of WAMZ and BCEAO/UMOA, under the chairmanship of His Excellency, President Abdoulaye Wade, Chairman of UEMOA and in-coming Chairman of ECOWAS.

THE ECOWAS PASSPORT

20. The Authority commended the Republic of Benin for issuing the ECOWAS passport, and took note of the measures taken by the Republic of Mali to issue the passport in the very near future. The Authority urged all the other Member State to take the necessary measures to ensure the introduction of the ECOWAS passport without further delay.

SECTORAL POLICIES

Special Regional Food Security Programme

- 21. The Authority adopted the Special Regional Food Security Programme in recognition of the important role of agriculture in the socioeconomic development of Member States.
- 22. The Authority also recognised the relevance of integrated water resource management in West Africa, to the achievement of regional food security, and directed the Executive Secretary to take all necessary measures for the prompt implementation of regional action programme on the integrated management of water resources. The Executive Secretary was requested to work closely with the FAO to mobilise the necessary financial resources from external partners towards the implementation of this important regional programme.

Cooperation in the Energy Sector

23. The Authority, concerned by the continuing energy crisis in the region, reaffirmed its determination to build the West African. Power Pool which will promote the joint exploitation of the energy resources of the Member States and enable them to fulfil their development needs. In order to render

- the Power Pool Operational, the Authority adopted a resource mobilisation mechanism to finance the various priority activities of the project.
- 28. The Authority declared payable the first Tranche of the Called-up Capital of the ECOWAS Bank for Investment and Development, amounting to one hundred and forty million seven hundred thousand thirty five units of account (UA 140,700,035), representing thirty-five percent (35%) of the regional members'share of the authorised capital.

REGIONAL PEACE AND SECURITY

- 29. The Authority reviewed the political and security situation in the sub-region and commended Sierra Leone for the tremendous progress it has made in the restoration of peace and security.
- 30. The Authority also expressed satisfaction at the efforts by the government of Sierra Leone and the Joint Committee on Disarmament to implement the demobilisation, disarmament and rehabilitation (DDR) programme. In addition, the Authority congratulated the government of Sierra Leone for the efforts made towards the organisation of elections in May 2002.
- 31. The Authority made a strong appeal to the international community to assist the government of Sierra Leone to complete the disarmament, demobilisation and rehabilitation of ex-combatants and to resolve the humanitarian problems and promote the resettlement and rehabilitation of refugees, displaced persons and excombatants. The donors were urged to provide the necessary financial assistance for the resolution of these problems

SITUATION IN THE MANO RIVER REGION

32. The Authority took note of the evolution of the situation in the Mano River region, and expressed its satisfaction at the positive development in the zone. The Authority appealed to Member States of the region to intensify the dialogue they had Initiated, in order to restore lasting peace. In this regard, the Authority congratulated the Mano River women's network for the initiative taken towards the re-establishment of dialogue between the three countries of the Union as a means of promoting durable peace in that sub-region.

LIBERIA

- 33. Expressing deep concern about the continued rebel attacks against the government of Liberia, especially in Lofa County, and the attendant risks of destabilisation, the Authority strongly condemned the activities of armed rebels in Liberia and approved the sanctions envisaged against these armed movements, particularly the Liberia Front for Reconciliation and Democracy (LFRD). The Authority requested the Liberia government to furnish all necessary information to the ECOWAS Mediation and Security Council for the imposition of the said sactions.
- 34. The Authority also expressed concern about the repercussions of the United Nations sanctions on the people of Liberia and expressed the view that the government of Liberia needed assistance that would enable it to embark on economic and social reconstruction of the country.
- 35. The Authority called on the government of Liberia to initiate a national reconciliation policy that would involve all sections of the society. To that end, the Authority expressed the willingness of the Community to provide the necessary assistance.

GUINEA BISSAU

36. The Authority expressed support for the ongoing rehabilitation and reconstruction process in Guinea Bissau and called on the international community to honour its financial pledges.

COTE D'IVOIRE

37. The Authority expressed satisfaction at the convening of the national reconciliation forum by the government of Cote d'Ivoire and the encouraging results achieved. It urged the government of the Republic of Cote dIvoire to continue its efforts to consolidate these achievenent, with a view to ensuring genuine reconciliation among the Ivorian citizens.

MECHANISM FOR CONFLICT PREVENTION, MANAGEMENT AND RESOLUTION

38. The Authority noted with satisfaction that the organs established under the ECOWAS Mechanism for Conflict Prevention, Management and Resolution had become operational. The Authority appealed to Member States which had not yet done so, to take every necessary measure to ratify the relevant Protocol. The Authority also

- expressed its profound gratitude to the European Union, the government of Canada and the United States of America, the United Nations, aand all other partners, for assisting ECOWAS in establishing the conflict prevention mechanism.
- 39. The Heads of States and Government noted with satisfaction the progress made in the area of democracy in the region. In order to consolidate the gains made, the Authority adopted the Protocol on Democracy and Good Governance to further promote democracy, the rule of law and human rights in Member States as well as prevent conflicts.

HUMAN TRAFFICKING

40. To combat the rising incidence of human trafficking in the region, the Authority adopted the Political Declaration and Initial Plan of Action Against Human Trafficking and appealed to Member States to effectively implement the provisions of the declaration and plan of action. The Authority also expressed its gratitude to the United Nations International Drug Control Programme and the United Nations Crime Prevention Centre for its contribution to the elaboration of the working documents on human trafficking.

RIGHTS OF THE WEST AFRICAN CHILD

41. The Heads of States and Government, expressing particular concern at the violence meted out to children particularly in conflict zones and by the suffering endured by handicapped children, declaredth adherence to the inalienable principles of the African Charter for the Rights and Welfare of the Child and the Convention on the Rights of the Child. In this connection, they declared the period from 2001 to 2010 "The Decade of the ECOWAS Child"

PROTOCOL ON THE FIGHT AGAINST CORRUPTION

42. Desirous of eradicating scourge of corruption which seriously undermines the development efforts of Member States, the Authority adopted the Protocol on the Fight against Corruption and appealed to all the governments of the Community to abide by the provisions of the protocol and promte cross border cooperation in this area.

THE FIGHT AGAINST TERRORISM

43. Considering that terrorism constitute a serious threat to world peace and security, the Authority strogly condemned the terrorist

attacks recently carried out against the United States and urged all Member States to ratify, within the shortest time possible, all the the United Nations and OAU conventions on terrorism, the United Nations Convention on organised cross border crime, and the ECOWAS conventions on mutual assistance in legal matters and extradition. The Authority also called on Member States to implement the provisions of the Dakar Declaration on terrorism.

INTER-GOVERNMENTAL ACTION GROUP AGAINST MONEY LAUNDERING (GIABA)

44. The Authority took note of the opening of the GIABA Secretariat in Dakar, and called on Member States to take all necessary measures to render this institution operational and equip it to combat money laundering and all related crimes effectively.

MORATORIUM ON THE IMPORTATION, EXPORTATION AND MANUFACTURE OF SMALL ARMS

- 45. The Authority expressed satisfaction at the extension of the moratorium for a period of three years and called on Member States to fulfil their commitments within the framework of the Code of Conduct for the application of the Moratorium.
- The Authority directed the Executive Secretary to take the necessary measures to mobilise the funds for the execution of activities envisaged under the Moratorium.

MEDIATION AND SECURITY COUNCIL

47. The Authority adopted the new composition of the Mediation aand Security Council. The members of the Mediation and Security Council are: Burkina Faso, Ghana, Guinea, Liberia, Mali, Niger, Nigeria, Senegal, Sierra Leone and Togo.

COUNCIL OF ELDERS

48. The Authority took note of the report of the inaugural meeting of the Council of Elders held in Niamey from 2 to 4 July 2001 and approved the list of members proposed by the ECOWAS Executive Secretariat.

INSTITUTIONAL ISSUES

49. The Authority expressed satisfaction at the effective establishment of the ECOWAS Court of Justice and Parliament. The Heads of State and Government stressed the need to provide these Institutions with adequate

manpower and financial resources to enable them function normally. In this respect, the Authority requested Member States to take necessary measures to ensure the application of the Protocopl on the Community levy so as to generate the required financial resources for the community institutions.

- 50. The Authority directed the Executive Secretary to undertake aa study on the ECOWAS Parliament with the objective of enhancing its powers furthermore, the Executive Secretary was requested to initiate a study on the restructuring of the Community institutins within the conmtext of the African Union.
- 51. The Authority decided to locate the headquarters of the ECOWAS Parliament and the Court of Justice in Abuja, Federal Republic of Nigeria.
- 52. The Authority, recalling, the need to more closely involve the civil society in the integration process, requested the West African Youth Union (WAYU) and the Ministerial Conference on Youth and Sports (MCYS) to harmonise their programmes so as to achieve an effective involvement of the Youth in the regional integration process.

THE ECOWAS ANTHEM AND FLAG

THE ANTHEM

53. The Authority adopted the lyrics of the ECOWAS Anthem, However, the Executive Secretary was requested to review it so as to shorten it and reduce the long pause between the two verses.

THE FLAG

54. The Authority directed the Executive Secretary to organise another competition on the ECOWAS Flag which should take into account the observations of the jury and conducted under the supervision of the Chairman of the ECOWAS Authority.

COOPERATION WITH DEVELOPMENT PARTNERS

55. The ECOWAS Heads of State and Government reiterated their appreciation to their development partners particularly the OAU, the European Union, USAID, the ADB, ECA, UNDP, the World Bank, the IMF, ITU, FAO, Japan, Canada, Germany and Frace, for the various forms of support extended by them towards the success of

the regional integration process. The Authority directed the Executive Secretary to continue his efforts at extending ECOWAS cooperation relations to other partners.

NOMINATION OF HEADS OF ECOWAS INSTITUTIONS.

THE FCOWAS EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

56. The Authority nominated **Dr. Mohamed Ibn CHAMBAS** of the Republic of Ghana to the post of the Executive Secretary of ECOWAS for a term of four years.

PRESIDENT OF THE ECOWAS BANK FOR INVESTMENT AND DEVELOPMENT (EBID)

57. The Authority requested the Republic of Benin to fill the post of President of ECOWAS Bank for Investment and Development (EBID).

FINANCIAL CONTROLLER

58. The Authority requested the Republic of The Gambia to fill the post of Financial Controller.

TRIBUTE TO THE OUT-GOING EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

The Authority warmly commended the outgoing Executive Secretary, Mr. Lansana KOUYATE, for the excellent work he had accomplished at the helm of the Community Institutions. The Authority aalso paid him a glowing tribute for his dynamism and for injecting a new lease of life into the Community and strengthening the regional integration process in Africa.

ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN OF AUTHORITY

60. The Heads of State and Government elected **His Excellency Abdoulaye WADE**, President of the Republic of SENEGAL as the Chairman of the ECOWAS Authority of Heads of State and Government.

DATE AND VENUE OF NEXT SUMMIT

61. The next ordinary session of the Authority of Heads of State and Government shall be held in December 2002 at a venue to be determined through consultation.

VOTE OF THANKS

62. The Heads of State and Government expressed their profound gratitude to His Excellency Abdoulaye WADE, President of the Republic of Senegal for the exemplary

leadership he has demonstrated in his promotion of the African Union. They expressed particular appreciation at the brotherly welcome extended to them and the excellent facilities placed at their disposal during their stay in Dakar. The Heads of State expressed their appreciation to President WADE for his role in support of the democratisation process in his country, which he has always served with commendable dedication.

63. The Heads of State and Government expressed their best wishes to His Excellency President WADE and also wished peace and prosperity to the brotherly People of Senegal.

The Authority also expressed its appreciation to the staff of the ECOWAS Secretariat without whom the Community would not have achieved this measure of success.
